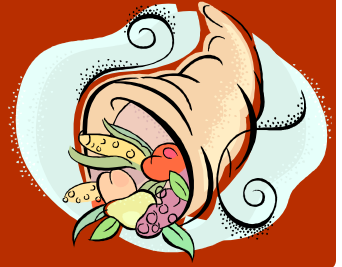

### Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade



Macy's started their Thanksgiving Day Parade in 1924 because many of the immigrant workers that worked at the Department store wanted to celebrate Thanksgiving but wanted to incorporate some of the flair and excitement they were accustomed to in Europe. So the immigrants dressed up and paraded from 145<sup>th</sup> Street to 34<sup>th</sup> Street. In the first parade, animals that were borrowed from the Central Park Zoo, was in the parade along with bands and floats. The parade became a success and the start of a Thanksgiving tradition.

Every year the parade grew bigger and more people got involved in the parade. In 1927, large balloons were used, and Felix the Cat was the first balloon in the Macy's parade. At the end of the parade the balloons would be released and if someone would find the balloon they would be able to claim a prize from Macy's. Although this no longer takes place, the parade still offers a variety of large balloons. In 1940 the parade was halted due to the war and the helium and rubber couldn't be used for fun when it was needed elsewhere.



In 1945, the parade returned and it was the first year the parade was televised. By the 1950's the parade was a hit on television and it became a Thanksgiving Day tradition for families around the country. One of the main traditions the parade has had from the beginning, is the arrival of Santa Claus in Herald Square. The first year though Santa appeared at the store's entrance of 34<sup>th</sup> Street, now kids wait for him to appear at the end of the parade.

# CAC Home Energy Assistance Program

## Winter Crisis Program

2011-2012

Effective November 1, 2011 through March 31, 2012

The Winter Crisis Program is a federally funded program designed to help eligible Ohioans meet the rising cost of home heating during the winter months. Applicants must meet 200% of Federal Poverty Guidelines. The Winter Crisis Program can prevent disconnection of heating utilities and restore heating services to households that have been disconnected. The program can also pay for an emergency delivery of bulk fuel for households with less than 10-day supply or (25% of less) of bulk fuel. Households may receive assistance with Winter Crisis Program one time during the program.

**Regulated gas and electric:** The utility must be shut off or a shut-off notice received. Households can receive up to \$175 total. The \$175 payment will stop disconnection, transfer services, or restore services for both regulated utilities. This is a one-time benefit and both utilities must be taken care of at the time of application.

**Non-regulated electric:** The utility must be shut off or a shut-off notice received. Households can receive up to \$450. The \$450 can be used to stop disconnection, transfer service or restore service. If \$450 is not enough to cover the emergency, contact your utility for co-payment requirements.

Bulk fuel assistance is available in various amounts depending upon the type of fuel. Please bring a bulk fuel account number and our vendor name along with your current electric bill when applying for bulk fuel assistance.

CAC will also assist homeowners with the repair of primary heating systems up to \$175.

Add \$7,640 for each additional member for households with more than eight (8) members.

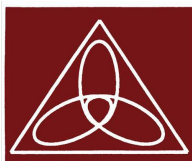
**CAC can accept only seventeen (17) walk-in appointments each Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday. Our offices open at 7:45 am.**

**Walk-ins must be already disconnected, or have a disconnect notice for that day or the next day, or be totally out of fuel. All others must call to schedule an appointment or return as a Walk-in another day.**

740-289-2371 (TDD 740-289-2608) or Toll free 1-800-820-1185.

At the time of your walk-in or scheduled appointment you must have all of the following:

- Current documentation of all household income for 13 weeks prior to the appointment date.
- A valid photo ID for all adults 18 years of age or older.
- Proof of US citizenship and proof of disability.
- Social security cards and birth certificates for all household members.
- Current utility bills from AEP and Pike Natural Gas. Bills must be in the name of an adult household member to receive assistance with PIPP Plus.
- Current utility bills from non-regulated electric. Co-pay requirements must be discussed with your utility and paid prior to the interview.
- A copy of a bulk fuel bill with your account number and vendor name.
- Rent receipt. Copy of lease or landlord statement if heating bill is in landlord's name.
- DJFS case number, if receiving assistance.

The following documentation is required for Winter Crisis Program appointment:

**Proof of gross household income for the past 13 weeks verified by the following:**

Social Security, SSI, SSDI, Pension, Veterans (VA), Retirement, School Employees Retirement System:

Award letter (current year), copy of check (check), or bank statement (if check is direct deposited)

Unemployment, Employment Disability, Worker's Compensation:

Award letter with clarification of amounts, or copy of check with explanation letter, including company name and address

Wages:

Pay stubs showing gross income for the past 13 weeks (customer must provide the last 13 paystubs for weekly wages or the last 7 paystubs for bi-weekly wages). If missing pay stubs, a statement from the employer showing gross income for the past 13 weeks is required. The statement must include employee name, pay dates, gross wages, deduction, company name, address, and phone number.

Self-Employment

Most recently filed tax returns - a signed IRS Form 1040 with Forms and Schedules.

OWF/TANF

Copy of Check, or ODJS Statement

Interest or IRA profits

Bank statement (if direct deposited)

Utility Allowance

A lease or housing authority documentation

Divorce Settlements, Child/Spousal Support, Alimony

Copy of checks, with oral clarification, or a statement from ODJS or Child Support agency, or a bank statement if direct deposited. Court documents will be accepted for proof of alimony.

Monetary Assistance

A signed letter from the person giving the applicant money including the amount(s) and the frequency of assistance.

No Income/Zero Income

A signed OCS Self-Declaration Form (provided at the interview) explaining how the customer is surviving and/or maintains their household. This form must explain in detail the customer's source of maintaining shelter; receiving food, etc.

Non-Discretionary Income

If payments for rent, utilities, etc. are paid directly to the payee (gas co., landlord, etc.) and this is documented from a signed letter of the person who paid the bill or a cancelled check, etc., this is considered Non-Discretionary income and would not be counted.

**Proof of Residence:** A copy of your lease or a utility bill with your name and address. Note: In order to qualify as a separate household, there must be a separate bath and kitchen and utility meter.

**Current Electric and Main Heating Bills:** Both main heating and electric bills are required for the face-to-face interview. If the utility is in the landlord's name and will not allow it to be changed and the customer is responsible for the bill, the customer can be assisted; however, documentation in the form of a lease, or a statement from the landlord, stating the customer is responsible for the bill is required. Also required is a copy of the bill showing the account number. If the utility bill is in the name of an adult living outside of the household, that adult must have power-of-attorney to represent the applicant or must transfer the electric account to the applicant.

**Proof of Co-Pay:** If the utility requires more than the maximum allowable amount to guarantee service for 30 days, any amount over the maximum allowable amount is called a "Co-Pay." Documentation that the co-pay was paid must be provided at the HEAP interview.

**Verification of Social Security Numbers** are required for all household members. Copies of Social Security cards fulfill this requirement.

**Proof of US Citizenship** such as birth certificate/hospital record, military service record, US passport or voter registration card should be provided for all household members; however it is required for the primary applicant. Non-US citizens must provide proof of Alien Status.

**Proof of Disability** is required for the face-to-face interview for any household which has a member who is classified as permanently and totally disabled by state or federal agency.

**Date of Birth** for all household members is required.

**Landlord information:** Landlord name, address, phone number, and amount of rent must be provided.

**Emergency Home Energy Assistance Program – Winter Crisis Program (E-HEAP)**  
**Administered by the Community Action Committee of Pike County**  
**Program begins: November 1, 2011, Program ends: March 31, 2012**

Customers who need assistance with winter heating bills may apply at one of two locations for the Emergency HEAP Winter Crisis Program. Customers may apply at Community Action Committee of Pike County (CAC), 941 Market Street, Piketon (289-2371). The Pike County Senior Center, 402 Clough Street, Waverly (947-5555) will be taking applications for all senior citizens of Pike County. Appointments will be taken only by phone at both locations.

With one application, households may apply for federal and state-funded energy assistance for the Home Energy Assistance Program (Regular or State HEAP), Emergency HEAP (E-HEAP) Winter Crisis Program and Percentage of Income Payment Plan Plus (PIPP Plus). An appointment is required.

The E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program provides assistance once per heating season to eligible households that are disconnected, threatened with disconnection, or have less than a ten-day supply (or 25% or less) of bulk fuel. Applicants must provide proof of residency, a copy of their utility bills for both the main heating and electric utility source, proof of income for all household members for the past 13 weeks, documentation of co-payment if required, proof of disability, proof of citizenship and social security cards for all household members. All applicants requesting assistance are required to provide the most current electric bill even if utility assistance for electricity is not being requested. Customers are encouraged to call prior to their appointment to make sure they have all documentation required.

Eligible households whose main heating source and/or necessary secondary heating source (electricity and natural gas) has been disconnected, or threatened with disconnection, may receive E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program funds for regulated utilities (AEP and Pike Natural Gas) or for rural cooperative electric companies. The electric and natural gas bill must be in the name of an adult household member or the landlord. If bill is in the landlord's name the customer must provide a statement from the landlord stating the applicant is responsible for the electric bill.

A household is eligible to receive a delivery of fuel if their tank contains 25% or less of its capacity. A household is eligible for a delivery of coal or wood, a delivery of propane/bottled gas, or a delivery of fuel oil or kerosene, all of which are classified as deliverable fuels. Along with the bulk fuel benefit, the applicant may also receive assistance with their electric source, if the maximum benefit amount will resolve the emergency for both energy sources. For regulated electric and municipalities and co-ops, a benefit can be used towards the electric source as long as a sufficient amount of fuel is delivered to end the customer's crisis. A 30-day line of credit may be arranged for propane customers that use 120 gallon tanks or 100 pound cylinders or for oil/kerosene customers that use tanks smaller than 100 gallons.

For American Electric Power (AEP) or Pike Natural Gas customers only: If a household has received a disconnect notice and no E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program appointments are available prior to the disconnect date, that household should obtain an appointment for the earliest available date and contact CAC or the Pike County Senior Center (for senior citizens only) with information from the utility bill. CAC Social Service Department staff or Pike County Senior Center staff shall notify the utility company of the appointment date and request an extension on the disconnect date. The appointment must be kept or the account is subject to disconnect.

The E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program can also help pay for heating system repairs in certain cases up to the maximum benefit amount. A household can receive E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program assistance only once per winter season .

Applications for E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program will be accepted November 1, 2011 through March 31, 2012. Appointments will be scheduled by phone beginning October 18, 2011 and continuing through March 31, 2012 at Community Action Committee of Pike County and at the Pike County Senior Center for senior citizens.

Beginning November 1, 2011 and continuing through March 31, 2012, a *limited number* of Walk-in customers will be scheduled each Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday beginning at 8:00 a.m. at the Community Action Committee of Pike County in Piketon. CAC can only accept seventeen (17) walk-in appointments each walk-in day. CAC offices open at 7:45 am. All others must call to schedule an appointment.

In addition, a limited number of senior citizens will be scheduled as Walk-ins each Thursday beginning at 8:00 a.m. at the Pike County Senior Center in Waverly. The Pike County Senior Center can only accept nine (9) walk-in appointments each Thursday. The Pike County Senior Center offices open at 8:00 am. All others must call to schedule an appointment.

Walk-in customers are seen on a first-come, first-served basis and only if one of the following applies:

- the electric or natural gas is disconnected
- the electric or natural gas will be disconnected that day, or the household is completely out of fuel (wood, propane, fuel oil).

The applicant must have all documentation at the time of the walk-in visit in order for an eligibility determination to be made. Customers are encouraged to call prior to their appointment to make sure they have all documentation required.

Households whose gross income is at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines are eligible for the E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program. A household whose total income during the past 3 months prior to the HEAP interview is equal to or less than the following maximums may be eligible:

For households with more than eight members, add \$7,640 for each individual.

E-HEAP Winter Crisis Program is a special component of HEAP that provides payment assistance once per heating season to consumers who:

- Have been disconnected or received a disconnection notice or Have less than a ten-day supply (or 25% or less) of bulk fuel

HOW TO APPLY FOR EMERGENCY HEAP Winter Crisis Program:

- Schedule an appointment at the Community Action Committee of Pike County (740) 289-2371 (TDD 740-289-2608) or the Pike County Senior Center for senior citizens (740) 947-5555
  - Arrive promptly at your appointment time for a face-to-face interview.
  - Provide the most recent utility bills for both the main heating and electric utility source. Account number and name of vendor is required for bulk fuel.
  - Provide proof of disability.
  - Provide documentation of gross income for the past 13 weeks for **all** household members 18 years of age or older.
  - Provide verification of Social Security numbers for all household members.
  - Provide ID and proof of citizenship (required for main applicant).
  - Provide documentation of co-payment (if required).
  - Provide proof of residence. The utility bill fulfills this requirement if the utility bill lists the applicant's name and address.
  - Provide a rent receipt and the landlord's name, address and phone number.
  - Provide a document of responsibility or lease, if required. (If the utility bill is in the name of the landlord and the landlord will not allow the account to be transferred to the applicant, a lease or statement from the landlord, indicating the applicant is responsible for the bill, is required).
  - Provide a power of attorney or notarized statement, if required. (An applicant may be represented by a non-household member at the EHEAP Winter Crisis Program interview by providing a power of attorney, or a notarized statement, at the time of the interview).
- Provide proof of custody for minor children, if required. (For marital status of divorced or separated parents).
