Maybe you saw their watery eyes as they realized that they weren't going to lose their house after all. Maybe it was just a "thank you" whispered as you left their home after installing their new furnace. Maybe you have noticed them opening up more and more during their therapy sessions.

No matter how small the progress may feel at times, the relationships you are building and the trust you are gaining are critical to everything we do at Community Action Committee of Pike County. We are not there (yet), but we are making a real and lasting difference in our communities – one relationship at a time.

- Q: Do you have any insight into how I can build relationships with my clients so CAC can better meet their needs?
- A: Empathy is so important to this. Empathy means that you understand and share the feelings of others. When you empathize with your clients and patients, you can see yourself in their situation. You are able to see their problems and needs from their unique perspective—which may be very different from yours. You can understand the impact of their circumstances on their lives. Being able to put yourself "in their shoes" will make you better equipped to help in real and lasting ways.
